Around 2:30 AM one morning Anne indicated that she needed to be headed to the hospital. But as things quickly progressed, she was unable even to get in the car to travel for the hour it would take to get there. With a very responsive midwife nearby, Beatrice arrived around 4 AM, lovingly surrounded by her whole family. Shortly after her birth, arrangements needed to be made to transport Anne and Beatrice to the hospital for the required monitoring and support. At this point, two ambulances, six paramedics, and three police officers arrived in response to the call to transport them to the hospital. Although this seemed a bit excessive, one paramedic commented, upon entering the house, "there sure are a lot of people here!" (well, of course - two sets of grand parents, two parents, and six children), my thought was "right back atcha!" - six paramedics, three police officers, and two ambulances!

We give thanks to God for Beatrice's safe arrival and treasure the time we had together sharing in her arrival. Anne continues to remain mostly stable with respect to her cancer, and we have learned to cherish each new day as a gift from God.

With our move to Barrie we've been privileged to help Adara (soon 6) and Vivian (soon 4) get started in their new school, and two-year-old Cassidy's language skills are growing exponentially.
